IMMOVABLE HOPE

"Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful."
(Hebrews 10:23)

Introduction

Hope is a powerful force that sustains believers through life's trials and uncertainties. However, the hope that truly anchors and transforms lives is found in Christ. Biblical hope is not mere wishful thinking or an escapist mentality. Instead, it is a confident expectation rooted in God's promises. It sustains us during hardships, fuels our faith, and provides assurance for the future.

Throughout Scripture, we see that hope is intricately tied to faith and endurance. Hebrews 11:1 reminds us that "faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." This means that hope is the precursor of faith just as hope is a vital element of faith, giving us the strength to trust in God's unseen yet certain promises. Colossians 1:27 declares, "Christ in you, the hope of glory," affirming that our hope is centered in Jesus. Likewise, Jeremiah 17:7 states, "Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, and whose hope is the Lord."

Hope in Christ is not fleeting; it is secured by His resurrection, as 1 Peter 1:3-5 declares: "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In His great mercy He has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." This study guide explores how we can anchor our hope in Christ, drawing insights from various scriptural themes. We have lined up 12 thematic areas around hope that will help us to ground ourselves into the immovable hope that is assured in the scriptures. Each of the 12 thematic area has three subthemes related to the thematic area which we hope shall be the area of focus each month for you as an individual, ministry or district.

Mode of Study

For this study we shall employ *Inductive Bible Study mode*, which is a transformative approach to studying scriptures.

What is Inductive Bible Study?

Inductive Bible Study (IBS) is a method of studying Scripture that emphasizes personal discovery and a structured approach to understanding the biblical text. It is a powerful and enriching way to engage with Scripture. It equips believers to seek truth directly from God's word, deepening both knowledge and personal faith. Whether studying alone or in a group, this method provides a pathway for discovering biblical truths and applying them in a meaningful way. By embracing observation, interpretation, and application, one can experience Scripture in a transformative and life-changing manner.

IBS involves three key steps: **Observation, Interpretation, and Application**. Unlike other study methods that rely heavily on external commentaries or pre-existing theological perspectives, the inductive method encourages individuals to engage deeply with the text and allow Scripture to speak for itself.

How to Conduct an Inductive Bible Study

The inductive study method follows a structured approach that fosters deeper engagement and understanding.

The three steps are:

1. Observation – What does the text say?

This step focuses on carefully examining the passage to understand its content. Key questions to ask include: Who is speaking, and to whom? What is happening in the passage? When and where does this take place? Are there key words, repeated phrases, or contrasts? What is the tone or mood of the passage? What is the literary form (narrative, poetry, prophecy, epistle, etc.)?

When observing a text, read the passage multiple times, underline or highlight significant words and phrases, take notes on anything that stands out.

2. Interpretation – What does the text mean?

This step seeks to uncover the meaning behind the passage. It requires understanding the historical and literary context, the original audience, and the intended message. Ask yourself: What is the main idea or theme of the passage? What did this mean to the original audience? How does this passage fit within the larger biblical narrative? What does this reveal about God, humanity, and faith? Are there cross-references that provide deeper insight?

Some of the helpful tools for interpretation include: Comparing different Bible translations, using a Bible dictionary or concordance, studying cultural and historical backgrounds and looking at parallel passages and themes in Scripture

3. Application – How does the text apply to me?

The final step makes the passage personally relevant by reflecting on how it influences one's faith and daily life. What to consider during application includes: What lessons or truths can I apply to my life? Are there any attitudes or behaviors that need to change? How does this passage challenge or encourage me? What specific actions can I take based on what I've learned?

Some practical Steps for Application include: Writing down key takeaways and action steps, praying for guidance on applying Scripture and sharing insights with others for accountability and encouragement.

Why Choose Inductive Bible Study Over Other Methods?

Inductive Bible Study stands out from other study methods for several reasons:

- **1. Encourages personal engagement** Instead of relying solely on external commentaries, inductive study helps individuals uncover biblical truths firsthand.
- **2. Provides a structured yet flexible approach** It offers a clear framework while allowing room for personal discovery and reflection.
- **3.** Enhances understanding of scripture By focusing on context and detailed analysis, it prevents misinterpretation and promotes deeper comprehension.
- **4. Fosters spiritual growth** The process encourages transformation by applying God's word to daily life.
- **5.** Works well for individual and group study It can be done alone or with others, making it a versatile approach for discipleship and teaching.

JULY: UNDERSTANDING AND AVOIDING FALSE HOPE

Introduction

Hope is essential for a meaningful and fulfilling life, but not all hope is true or lasting. False hope is deceptive—it offers temporary comfort but ultimately leads to disappointment and destruction. Many people place their hope in human philosophies, material wealth, or religious traditions that lack Christ. This month, we will explore how to discern false hope and anchor ourselves in the true hope found in Jesus.

Study 1: The Deception of False Philosophies

Text: Colossians 2:6-15

Paul warns believers against being taken captive by hollow and deceptive philosophies that depend on human traditions rather than Christ. Many ideologies promise hope, but only faith in Jesus provides true freedom and security. By being rooted in Christ, we guard ourselves against worldly teachings that lead to false hope.

Study Questions

1.	Observation: What does Paul warn the Colossians about in verse 8?
2.	Interpretation: How does Paul describe the fullness believers have in Christ? (Verses 9-10)
3.	Application: In what ways can we ensure our hope is anchored in Christ rather than deceptive teachings?

Study 2: The Danger of a Distorted Gospel

Text: Galatians 1:6-10

Paul strongly rebukes those who preach a different gospel, warning that any message apart from the true gospel of Christ is a false hope. Many are led astray by teachings that mix truth with error, but the gospel of grace must remain pure. Those who seek approval from men rather than God may fall into this deception, but true hope rests in the unchanging message of salvation through Christ.

prospe the Lo	pook of Proverbs contrasts the fate of the righteous and the wicked. While the wicked may seem to extract for a time, their hope ultimately perishes. True hope is found in walking in righteousness, fearing rd, and living according to His ways. The words of the righteous bring life, but the hopes of the lare cut short. This passage reminds us to place our trust in God, whose promises are eternal.
Study	Questions:
1.	Observation: According to verse 28, what is the difference between the hopes of the righteous

2.	Interpretation: How does the fear of the Lord lead to a lasting hope?

3.	Application: What steps can we take to ensure our nope is based on righteousness rather than
	temporary worldly success?

Conclusion:

False hope is one of the greatest dangers a believer can face. It is deceptive, offering temporary comfort but ultimately leading to disappointment. This month's studies reveal that false hope often stems from human traditions, distorted teachings, and misplaced trust in worldly things. Colossians 2 warns us against empty philosophies, Galatians 1 cautions us about false gospels, and Proverbs 10 shows us the stark contrast between the fate of the righteous and the wicked.

True and lasting hope is found only in Christ. When we are firmly rooted in Him, we are not easily swayed by deception. This study challenges us to examine where we place our hope and to ensure that it is grounded in the unshakable truth of God's Word. By doing so, we build a faith that endures and a hope that never fails.

Memory Verse: Galatians 1:9 – "If anybody is preaching to you a gospel other than what you accepted, let them be under God's curse!"

AUGUST: HOPE IN SHARING THE LOVE OF CHRIST

Introduction

Hope is not meant to be kept to ourselves—it is a gift that must be shared with others. As believers, we are called to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ so that others may also find the hope that transforms lives. Sharing the love of Christ is both a privilege and a responsibility. This month, we will explore how hope motivates us to evangelise, defend our faith, and actively participate in God's mission.

Study 1: The Great Commission – A Call to Share Hope

Matthew 28:18-20

Before ascending to heaven, Jesus gave His disciples the Great Commission—to go and make disciples of all nations. The hope we have in Christ is not meant to be hidden—it is meant to be shared. This month's studies have shown that evangelism is an essential response to the hope we have received. Through the Great Commission, Jesus commands us to make disciples. Peter urges us to be ready to defend our hope with gentleness and respect. Paul reminds us of the urgency of proclaiming the gospel, as faith comes through hearing the message of Christ.

As we go through life, let us not keep the hope of salvation to ourselves. Instead, let us boldly and lovingly share the love of Christ with those around us. Whether through words, actions, or the testimony of our lives, we are called to be ambassadors of the living hope that changes hearts and brings eternal life.

Romans 10:15 – "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

SEPTEMBER: HOPE IN CHRIST'S SERVICE

Introduction:

Serving others is not merely a duty—it is a hopeful response to God's grace. When we serve with love, humility, and faith, we express our confident hope that God is actively working through us. Service, rooted in hope, reflects the life and ministry of Jesus who came not to be served but to serve. As we serve, we become carriers of His light and love in a broken world, trusting that every act of faithfulness contributes to God's redemptive plan.

Study 1: Serving with Compassion

Text: Luke 10:26-37

In this passage, Jesus tells the parable of the Good Samaritan to illustrate what it means to truly love one's neighbour. The Samaritan's willingness to help someone in need, despite cultural differences and personal inconvenience, reveals a heart of compassionate service. This is the kind of hope-filled service Jesus calls us to—one that breaks down walls, takes risks, and reflects God's mercy.


